- **Social Work in the Field:**

Social work today is becoming more important because thousands of persons are benefiting from its services, current evidence indicates that social work is emerging, as an important profession in the modern world to stay and that in the decade ahead it will likely grow and expand its services, helping more people with personal, family, organization and community problems, especially problems related to social functioning.

The provision of social services is arranged within fields of practice that revolve around social needs or problems and that reflect a range of intervention strategies.

Many social services are organized to reflect the needs of particular age groups in society, while other needs are universal to all groups.

Social workers are employed in broad fields of practice, such as: public Welfare, corrections, health system, child care and family services, handicapped welfare schools,....

Social work has a main role in the field of handicapped welfare.

How can social workers help?

Social workers who assist people with disabilities often have varied roles. Some may provide counseling, while others will ensure that their clients have access to stable housing and employment opportunities. While the jobs of these professionals will vary depending on the issues their clients face, the resources below will give social work degree seekers a better understanding of what their positions will entail should they choose to concentrate in this area.

What does a social worker do?

1- Social workers are an important part of the Department of disability services team supporting people with a disability and their families.

2- Social workers provide information, advocacy, social support, practical help, and counselling to people with a disability and their families,

3- Social workers work with people to assess their needs, help them set goals, work out strategies to achieve those goals and help people to develop the skills they need to manage their own lives.

4- He or she may work with people with a disability of all ages. Social workers negotiate, on behalf of people with a disability and their families, with government officials and organisations providing services.

5- Social workers may work every day as well as in times of crisis,
