Dr. M. I. Soueif

Dr. Soueif has now spent two terms in my department. He has attended lecture courses and seminars related to his particular interests, and has collaborated with me in carrying out several research projects. In all of this he has shown a very quick grasp of the essentials and has progressed very quickly indeed in his studies.

At the same time, I cannot feel that a period of one year is anything like sufficient enough for anyone to enter the very complex and difficult psychological and statistical problems connected with questionnaire and inventory construction and evaluation. Experience has shown that anything less than a two year period of study leaves serious gaps, and makes the person partially trained very much less effective from the point of view of teaching and research than he would otherwise be. It would seem a great pity if Dr. Soueif, having shown great ability and promise, should be prevented from pursuing his studies to their proper conclusion.

Dear Dr. Soueif,

Your paper on Extreme Response Sets as a Measure of Intolerance of Ambiguity attacks a very interesting problem and deals with it adequately. The paper should certainly be published, and I am glad to accept it for the British Journal of Psychology, with one qualification, upon which I should like your opinion. There is under discussion at present the creation of a new journal dealing mainly with the experimental approach to clinical and social problems. If during the year or so which is the present gap between acceptance and publication this new journal comes into existence, your paper would be more appropriate for it than for the British Journal. I should like, therefore, to ask that you consider the possibility of publishing in the new journal if in fact it comes into existence, and if it would not mean any additional delay in the appearance of your paper. Dear Dr. Soueif,

I am happy that you will be able to come. Yesterday we found an apartment for you, separate (2-room) and fully furnished (including bed linen, cooking utensils, silverware, dishes, etc.), costing about \$90. a month. It was necessary, in order to obtain it, to take it for a period beginning February 7th. However, we have been able to obtain a total of 4 months salary for you. This should cover your travel costs plus these additional 3 weeks of rent. You can terminate the rent at whatever time you leave, at the end of May or in June.

It has been asked recently whether you perhaps could teach a course in clinical psychology for graduate students while you are here. The number of hours of lectures or seminars you held in the course would be up to you. The students could be expected to do a considerable amount of work on their own. The limits of the area to be covered, whether a general introduction to clinical psychology or a more specialized area, could also be decided as you saw fit. It would not need to consume any great amount of your time here. If this is fine with you, we could announce it in a general way to the students before you came.

There is also a matter which you could take care of before you come, although it can also be taken care of here after your arrival. That is a work permit, which you supposedly could obtain there in a day or two from a Swedish embassy. If it can be easily arranged before you come, so much the simpler. Otherwise it can be taken care of after you come.

If you fly, Malmö and Copenhagen are closest. There is fast hydrofoil travel between Copenhagen and Malmö (35 minutes).

Dear Professor Soueif,

The meeting of the Scientific Group on the Use of Cannabis is now just under three months away. A substantial amount of preparatory work remains to be carried out in order that the best possible report will result from the work of the participants. It is essential that the Group's report be completed and approved before the members leave Geneva.

It is customary that the reports of scientific groups convened by WHO follow the subject headings of the agenda as adopted; a copy of the draft agenda was forwarded to you in an earlier letter. The report should be about 10,000 words, but in no case over 15,000. The reports of some previous Expert Committees and a Scientific Group, which are being forwarded under separate cover, will serve as examples of the type of report expected.

To facilitate this task, each member has been asked to prepare a working paper of limited length, which I may receive by 26 October, 1970, in order that it may be reproduced and circulated to all members by early November. We already have in hand an extensive working paper by our technical adviser, Dr William H. McClothlin, which has also been forwarded to you under separate cover. I hope that each participant will review the working papers and other materials being sent and, taking account of his own knowledge of the field, will note the data that he believes should be considered for inclusion in the final report, under each of the headings in the draft agenda. This might be done by noting relevant passages in the working papers and other pertinent materials and/or by preparing brief drafts of sentences or paragraphs for possible discussion.

... Under item 5 of the draft agenda, it is hoped the more important questions or hypotheses requiring further research can be listed, with primary attention being given to effects in man and to studies that may require cross-cultural approaches. Under item 6, it is intended that suggestions be offered as to the types of approaches and methods that seem most feasible or, perhaps the assets and liabilities of various methodological approaches to different questions.

In brief, it is hoped that the report will summarize existing knowledge (scientifically validated data and informed opinions) relative to the effects on man of the use of cannabis and point the way to urgently needed research.



MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT made this eighth day of September 1971, between the United Nations and Prof. M.I. Soueif (hereinafter referred to as the "subscriber"), whose address is 5 Sayed-el-Bakri Street, Gezira, Zamalek, Cairo/UAR.

Accordingly, the subscriber shall not be entitled to any benefit, payment, subsidy, compensation or entitlement, except as expressly provided in this agreement. In particular any national taxes levied on the remuneration paid to the subscriber under this agreement will not be reimbursed to the subscriber by the United Nations.

6. Title rights

The title rights, copyright rights, and all other rights of whatsoever nature in any material produced under the provisions of this agreement shall be vested exclusively in the United Nations.

7. Unpublished information

The subscriber shall not communicate to any person or other entity any unpublished information made known to him in the course of performing his obligations under the terms of this agreement except upon authorization by the United Nations.

I have pleasure in inviting you to serve as a member of a WHO Working Group on Guidelines for Collaborative Reporting on the Non-medical Use of Dependence-producing Drugs to be convened in Geneva 13-18 August 1973.

As a result of resolutions adopted by the World Health Assembly, WHO is endeavouring to establish means for the international collection and exchange of data on the incidence and prevalence of drug dependence and the human and environmental factors associated therewith. It is proposed to establish a system for the regular, periodic preparation by selected institutions and members of WHO Expert Advisory Panels on relatively brief, factual and interpretive reports based on currently available data about the non-medical use of dependence-producing drugs in various geographic areas, these reports to contain: (i) published objective data or informed opinion on the incidence and prevalence of drug dependence of various types; (ii) morbidity and mortality associated with drug-taking; (iii) the character and extent of treatment, rehabilitative and preventive services provided; (iv) the nature of sociocultural and other environmental factors that appear to be associated with drug-taking behaviour; and (v) the nature of policy changes relative to drug-taking and the manner of implementing these changes.

In order to achieve reasonable comparability in the format and content of the reports, it is proposed to develop guidelines to be used by those preparing the reports. To this end, a first draft of such guidelines has been prepared to serve as a basis for discussion by the Working Group. Members of the Group will be given an opportunity to review the draft guidelines prior to the meeting in order to facilitate the formulation of recommended modifications.

... Enclosed is a draft agenda for the meeting. Members of the Working Group are not being requested to prepare working papers in advance of the meeting, but it is expected that each will be prepared to consider in depth the agenda items and to cite specific references that may be useful in the implementation of the collaborative reporting system.

To review the field of psychosis in relation to cannabis use - this should include concepts relating to depressive psychosis, schizophrenia and toxic psychoses. The problems of methodology in assessment should be covered, problems of categorization into psychiatric syndromes, and problems relating to pre-existing psychosis. Ideas for future research in this field should be discussed if there seems to be a case for continuing research along these lines.

Enclosed is a typescript copy of a paper I read to the Third International Cannabis Conference in London last May. The paper is composed of three main parts: the first reports on our findings administering 16 test variables to 850 Egyptian chronic cannabis takers and 839 controls; the second is a critical review of work done by a number of investigators on the immediate effects of cannabis consumption on psychomotor and cognitive deficits, and the third presents two broad hypotheses pertaining to what I temporarily call the differential effects of the drug on a number of psychomotor and cognitive functions. My idea can be summarized as follows:

- a) Cannabis takers score significantly below non-takers on most of our test variables.
- b) Other conditions being equal, the amount of discrepancy (or impairment) associated with drug taking differs systematically according to the level of pre-drug proficiency (as demonstrated in experiments on the acute effects, or as inferred in the field study we carried out on chronics).

The paper triggered two strong reactions: Some members of the conference said they believed I got something valuable to convey. Another group adopted a critical attitude based on the following points:

- a) That the discrepancies between takers and non-takers are indeed small and do not justify such fuss. (Thus they ignored the fact that differences were statistically significant, and that they came out consistently in a certain direction).
- b) That the results I got might have been influenced by the phenomenon of "regression towards the mean".

Because the critical group was reacting violently, and because there is now a lot of emotionality in this field of research, I feel that a lot of damage can be done to potentially good ideas (N.B. I am concerned with the academic worth of hunches, hypotheses, theories... etc.). The paper is already on its way to being published. Hence, fear of not having it published is no source of worry. The question I am considering now is the following: is it a worthwhile hypothesis I am considering here? And to what extent are you a little simple artefact of something like this "regression towards the mean?"

I would be grateful if you would be good enough to go through the paper (mainly the third part) and let me know your impressions. I apologise for encroaching on your time, but your criticism means a good deal to me, particularly as I am faced, for the first time, with what I may call 'scholar's' boogymen!

I am enclosing a typescript copy of an article on "Psychomotor and cognitive deficits associated with long- and short-term cannabis consumption: Comparison of research findings and discussion of selected extrapolations". It will be published shortly by the Ciba Foundation as part of the proceedings of the Third International Cannabis Conference, (London).

The paper comprises three main parts: a) Part I reports on our findings administering 16 objective test variables to 250 chronic cannabis takers and 839 controls. b) Part II reviews critically the results obtained by a number of investigators inquiring into the immediate effects of cannabis taking on psychomotor and cognitive functions. c) Part III presents a broad hypothesis pertaining to the differential effects of cannabis on psychomotor and intellectual functions.

When I read the paper to the Conference I was received with two different reactions; one group of participants were very emotional and reacted violently against part III. The main point they kept reiterating was that the discrepancies between takers and non-takers were very small, implying that in fact I was making 'much ado about nothing'. They completely ignored the fact that the differences were statistically significant (and indeed at a very high level of confidence in many cases). They also ignored the fact that these discrepancies came out consistently in one direction. Indeed the reaction of that group seemed so irrational and aggressive that it looked like hooliganism among intellectuals. The second group told me (but in a low voice as if they were intimidated) that they felt I had something serious to convey.

Because of these contradictory responses, and because I am contemplating pursuing the line of thinking developed in this paper, I would be grateful if you would read it and let me know about your impressions.

Many thanks for your letter of July 13th and the copy of your paper. The results certainly seem to me to be worthy of serious consideration, and I cannot take the two criticisms you mention very seriously. As regards regression towards the mean, I do not see how this applies in this situation at all; regression is certainly an important phenomenon but only when testing is repeated and there is a selection on the basis of the first testing, neither of which applies in your case. As regards the size of the differences, again I do not see that this is an important criticism. As you say, the differences are significant and hence require an explanation.

I wonder whether there may not be a simpler explanation than the one you prefer. Teasdale has found that you may remember that drug takers have high P scores and it is also well known that psychotics, as you yourself point out, tend to be slow etc. Is it not plausible to suggest that high P scorers, who may be assumed to be slow like schizophrenics will tend to develop into drug takers and that their slowness is not due to the effects of the drug but rather to their constitutional makeup? This would of course be difficult to establish as it would be awkward to have to find a sample of drug takers before they started taking drugs! Also of course we do not as yet have any direct evidence that high P scorers are in fact differentiated from low P scorers on the particular tests you used. Perhaps this could be an important additional study that ought to be done.

My general view then would be that yours is an important finding, that it is not vitiated by the criticisms that have been made of it, but that I think there are alternative explanations for the results which might deserve to be looked at.

Dear Dr. Soueif:

Thank you for your excellent manuscript which I read carefully. I noted on p. 1 that you assayed THC in 1967. I thought that at that time techniques of measurement were still being developed. Furthermore, the concentration you mention seems to be very low (3ml THC per cigarette). On p. 7 you mention that Jamaican chronic heavy users of ganjia did not present evidence of significant psychomotor impairment. However, in this study as reported in my book, Marihuana, Deceptive Weed, these subjects present a significant decrease in work efficiency (see p. 289-290). Except for these little details, I find your study most enlightening because it reconciles contradictions which are only contradictory in appearance.

I don't believe that you should be overly concerned by the strident reaction of ^{so}psychiatrists and socio-psychologists who have elected to ignore the meaning of statistics, cellular biology, endocrinology, and genetics. I believe therefore, that you should continue your studies and investigate further the very challenging hypothesis that you have developed.

THC in samples seized by the Egyptian authorities on the illicit market
this was done post hoc (about the end of 1971). I hope I will be able
to add a footnote to my paper stating this fact clearly.

As for the studies carried out on Jamaican chronic cannabis
takers I am quite aware of the study you mention in your book which was
published under the title "Effects of chronic smoking of cannabis in
Jamaica" by Vera Rubins and Lambros Comitas. But I am afraid I was
hinting at another work which was done by M. Bowman in partial fulfill-
ment for a Ph.D. degree at McGill University. Dr. Bowman published a
paper based on her thesis, entitled "Cannabis: Psychological effects of
chronic heavy use", Psychopharmacologia (Berl.), 29, 159-170 (1973).
In this report the investigator stated the following: "It was suggested
that heavy users of this drug did not show test performances indicating
impairment of psychological functioning comparable to other types of
organic cerebral dysfunction, nor did they show chronic changes in

When I read my paper to the Third Cambridge Conference in London last May a number of participants showed a certain dissatisfaction with my work. The main points were raised by way of criticisms:

- a) That my statistical analysis might have been influenced by the phenomenon of "regression towards the mean". This point was raised by Mr. Hasleton from Australia.
- b) That the differences between the test scores obtained by Cambridge takers and non-takers were quite small (implying that my conclusions were rather far fetched). This criticism was made by Dr. Grant of Canada.

I am enclosing a comment by Professor H. J. Eysenck of the University of London which I received recently, concerning these two points. Professor Eysenck is, as you must know, one of the most competent research psychologists regarding the use of statistical and psychometric techniques in modern psychological research.
